### Principal's Message:

The purpose of Lincoln High School is to provide an alternative education setting for San Leandro Unified School District students to earn a diploma in ways markedly different than the traditional education setting in our district's comprehensive high school. As credit deficiency is the main reason students enroll in Lincoln Continuation High School, we recognize that students have different reasons for being behind in credits: family concerns, truancy, relocating, COVID pandemic, and more. We provide our students with a non-traditional way of earning credits towards graduation while maintaining relevance and rigor. The staff at Lincoln High School works with students individually as young adults to help them gain academic focus, planning toward graduating and preparing them for future academic and occupational aspirations. Throughout their time at Lincoln, our students examine "What's at Their C.O.R.E." and learn how to increase their social/emotional awareness along with their academic skills.

Lincoln High School serves students in the 11th and 12th graders and offers a personalized learning environment with small classes and student choice both in the classroom and in school programs. Lincoln students can take up to six classes per day, taught from 9:00 a.m. to 2:46 p.m. Our before/after-school program offers enrichment opportunities to expand our students' interests and abilities. Lincoln High School is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and has been a Model Continuation High School in California.

### District Vision Statement:

Our mission is to educate these students to achieve academic excellence to become confident, collaborative, and engaged citizens in a community rich in heritage and diverse in culture, where traditions are valued, and innovations are embraced. This mission requires authentic, reciprocal partnerships with educators, families, and students and a persistent focus on eradicating institutional biases that have rendered historically inequitable outcomes for large segments of the community we serve. San Leandro Unified School District held a public hearing on September 14, 2021, and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, and science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. The State of California. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home.

Textbooks are adopted by the Board of Trustees after review by teachers and parents according to the timeline established by the State of California. All district-adopted textbooks are State Board adopted and aligned to the Academic Content Standards established by the California Board of Education. The old computer lab was converted to classroom space in 2017 to allow for increased enrollment. The school is connected to the city's fiber loop allowing for high-speed internet connection.

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The assessments were required to be:

- Aligned with CA CCSS for ELA and mathematics;
- Available to students in grades 3 through 8, and grade 11; and
- Uniformly administered across a grade, grade span, school, or district to all eligible students.

#### Options

Note that the CAAs could only be administered in-person following health and safety requirements. If it was not viable for the LEA to administer the CAAs in person with health and safety guidelines in place, the LEA was directed to not administer the tests. There were no other assessment options available for the CAAs. Schools administered the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments for ELA and mathematics, other assessments that meet the SBE criteria, or a combination of both, and they could only choose one of the following:

- Smarter Balanced ELA and mathematics summative assessments;
- Other assessments meeting the SBE criteria; or
- Combination of Smarter Balanced ELA and mathematics summative assessments and other assessments.

## Percentage of Students Meeting or Exceeding the State Standard on CAASPP

## 2021-22 School Safety Plan

The safety of students and staff is a primary concern at Lincoln High School. The school is in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake and fire standards. The School Site Safety plan is updated annually by teachers and classified staff. The key elements of the School Site Safety Plan include how to handle various emergencies which includes: staffing in an emergency, emergency procedures, supplies and student/staff safety.

To ensure student safety, staff members supervise students at all times before and after school, and during breaks. Lincoln is a closed campus and visitors are not allowed on campus without prior permission from the principal. In addition, we collaborate with SLPD to maintain student safety both on and off-campus.

As we transition back to full-time in person learning for the 2021-2022 school year, we are sure to maintain safety for our students and staff by following all COVID-19 protocols and use all appropriate PPE. Thorough protocols and guidelines are in place for classrooms, lunch time and other events that are held on campus.

All SLUSD schools have uniform emergency procedures for an intruder on campus, unsafe situations in the surrounding community, chemical spills, or environmental and natural disasters. All procedures were created in collaboration with local law enforcement and are based upon nationwide best practices. Procedures are kept confidential to the community to protect students and staff. In response to COVID-19, SLUSD will report all confirmed positive cases among personnel and students physically present at district schools and facilities during their infectious period for COVID-19. The infectious period begins two days before the onset of symptoms. If the case did not have symptoms, the infectious period is considered to be two days prior to the testing date.
